Non-Renewal – clients have not responded to ESD. ESD outreached for monthly renewals by phone, in writing, and inperson. For those who reach out to ESD after the eligibility period we continue to work with them to re-determine their eligibility. This number may decrease over time (instead of increase). ESD will continue to evolve their outreach.

Screening and Care Management

Agency of Human Services cross-departmental teams began working with households in the hotels/motels in October 2022.

Many of the households originally screened or with shared care plans are no longer in the hotel/motel system.

In order to supplement AHS staff and ensure timely screening and care planning, AHS has contracted with Rescue Inc. They started screening clients on July 19. Additionally, two TLC nurses have been working for the past 3 weeks in Hartford and Chittenden County.

A contract under the RFP will go into effect the first week in August to fully staff care management statewide – replacing TLC and Rescue. These staff will do screening and shared care planning and reporting.



Residential Capacity

- As of July 24, 154 Residential Mental Health Treatment beds with 2 currently available
- As of July 24, 63 Intensive Residential Treatment beds with 8 currently available
- As of July 24, 75 Recovery Housing beds with availability in seven districts
- As of July 17, 245 DOC Transitional Housing beds with 1 currently available
- As of July 25, 2,873 Skilled Nursing Facility beds with 157 currently available
- On September 8, AHS will have a full report on access to long-term residential care and assisted living, as well as an analysis of any potential barriers to expansion of these beds

RFP - contracting

RFP for Emergency Shelter Staffing and Services was issues on May 24, 2023 with proposals due by June 11, 2023

Reviewed responses to RFP and two contracts are under development:

- 1. Staffing for additional screening and case management for 6/30 cohort in the hotels (see screening and case management)
- 2. Staffing to fill gaps in community-based emergency shelters



Empowering Communities: Letters of Interest

- Requested Letters of Interest from communities starting May 22
- Communicated changes to priorities as the situation evolved
- Coordinate with communities through field service directors
 - Continue to hold regular meetings with local communities
- Met with coordinated entry providers statewide on June 29 and solicited feedback
- Weekly Department for Children and Families open office hours for community problem solving

Historic Timeline

Spring 2020 – Congregate shelters closed – clients moved to hotels – FEMA Feb 2023 – BAA extends, creates groups – GF – End date June/July 2023

May 2023 – EO extends – End date Aug 2023













Summer 2022 – Transitional Housing Program – ERAP – End date March 2023 May 2023 – Big Bill adds \$10m June 2023 – Act 81 extends – End date April 2024

Community Proposals: Letters of Interest

- Received 59 Letters of Interest from communities
 - There was a large range of letters saying they were interested in helping generally, to specific letters with budgets and timelines
 - All parties received a response
- Identified 31 to pursue
- Many require significant follow-up
- Types not pursued:
 - Requests for storage space
 - Requests for camping supplies
 - Requests to rent hotel rooms
 - Requests for designated camping sites

The following is a summary of community investments, both from the letters of interest, and from previous or subsequent community engagement



Housing Opportunity Grant Program (HOP) Status update

All HOP grants for July 1 have been executed, including with one-time funds

- 4 projects under development with a later start date
- 99.7% of total available HOP funds (all sources, including 1x) are obligated or earmarked

New base funding for HOP grants was prioritized for:

- Emergency Shelter expansion
 - includes continuing Elmwood & Steps shelter projects launched with 1x funds
- Expanding staffing at shelters to address safety concerns
- Addressing inflationary cost increases to preserve projects
- Preserving projects where loss of funding would have reduced capacity



HOP Grant Status update, cont.

One-time HOP funding was prioritized for:

- Flexible Client Financial Assistance to help homeless or at-risk households stabilize in housing (e.g., security deposits, rental arrears, transportation, fees, etc)
 - \$3.6m total with 2.5m from one-time funding, a \$1.2m increase over SFY23 (which was also supported in part by one-time funding)
- Day shelter expansion to address unsheltered homelessness, including food
- Staffing to expand housing navigation services
- Expanding rapid re-housing

New Projects in Communities

Expanded Emergency Shelter Capacity

New/Expanded:

- 2 seasonal shelters --> year-round (Burlington and Morrisville Districts), 31 HH (9 new HH)
- New & Expanded projects, 12 HH (Rutland, Barre and Springfield Districts)

Under Consideration/In Development: 8 potential projects could add about 150 HH capacity statewide (St. J, Barre, Brattleboro, Rutland and Hartford) between **SFY 24-26**

Day Shelter Capacity

New/Expanded: 4 projects (Burlington, Barre, Rutland & Morrisville Districts), some impacted by flooding

Street Outreach Expansion

In Development by DMH: 6 projects, many multi-agency (Burlington, Rutland, Bennington, Barre, Brattleboro & St. Albans)



New Projects in Communities

Medical Respite for homeless households exiting hospitals – new initiative in development by VDH

Hotel Conversions

Under Consideration/In Development: 3 projects (Barre and Bennington Districts)

Rapid Re-housing

In Development: 2 projects (Burlington and St Johnsbury)

New Permanent Housing Units for the Homeless – all districts with support from VHCB and VHIP, and consultation from DCF
